

NOVA SCOTIA SPORT HALL OF FAME TO HOLD TOP 15 DINNER EVENT IN PARTNERSHIP WITH SIDNEY CROSBY FOUNDATION

On Thursday, July 26, 2018, the Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame will present a major event called **One Night Only: The Top 15** to honour the Top 15 Nova Scotia athletes of all time and celebrate Nova Scotia sport.

Sponsored by Scotiabank Centre and media sponsor *The Chronicle Herald*, The Top 15 will be a one-night-only dinner event at the Halifax Convention Centre. Living members from the Top 15 list will share their stories with event emcee and Hall of Fame CEO Bruce Rainnie. Headlining the evening will be the athlete voted #1 in Nova Scotia history; Pittsburgh Penguins star Sidney Crosby of Cole Harbour.



The other athletes scheduled to attend are curling legend Colleen Jones of Halifax, Hockey Hall of Famer Al MacInnis of Port Hood, Olympic medallist for canoeing Steve Giles of Lake Echo, international softball star Mark Smith of Halifax, Kayaking World Champion Karen Furneaux of Waverley, Canada's top gymnast Ellie Black of Halifax, Paralympic gold-medallist Jamie Bone of Dartmouth, and Olympic medallist for kayaking Mark De Jonge of Halifax.

Proceeds from the event will be shared by the Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame and The Sidney Crosby Foundation.

Tickets are on sale now through Ticket Atlantic. Adult tickets are \$225 each and youth tickets (18 years and under) are \$125 each. Tables of ten can be purchased for \$2,250.

The Hall of Fame launched the Top 15 project in 2017 in order to honour Nova Scotia's rich sport heritage during Canada's 150th anniversary of confederation. A panel of sport-knowledgeable people, along with a public vote, named and ranked the 15 greatest Nova Scotia athletes of all time, who were then revealed weekly on CBC Nova Scotia from September 11 to December 18. The Top 15 athletes (in order from fifteenth to first) are: Rob McCall, Mark De Jonge, Jamie Bone, Ellie Black, Karen Furneaux, Mark Smith, Steve Giles, Aileen Meagher, Johnny Miles, George Dixon, Sam Langford, Nancy Garapick, Al MacInnis, Colleen Jones and Sidney Crosby.

HOW ITALY PREPARED ME FOR THE SPORTS INDUSTRY: PASSION




In this world, there are inextricable links behind the most unlikely of fields. The two fields of archaeology and sports are remarkably intertwined when it comes to the passion of an individual. Speaking from personal experience, my archaeological excavation in Italy two years ago was an unbelievable experience; one that is continually shaping me to work in the heritage sector.

In grade five, I first became passionate about history and archaeology when I learned of the ancient Egyptians. Studying ancient Egypt from an early age introduced me to an array of other cultures, which led me to want to help with discovering the world's history. Nine years later, in second year university, the opportunity to help understand the world's past came with an archaeological excavation in Pantelleria, Sicily, Italy, digging ancient Roman ruins. The physical experience of archaeology was quite different than I read about in books; it involved heavy labour – intensive work which was rewarding at every moment when an artefact arose from the soil. The day of an archaeologist involved waking up quite early, gathering gear at the brink of the stunning Pantellerian sunrise, and then digging. Years of passion and dreaming of an archaeological excavation led to this point in my academic career.

In many ways, there are parallels between the archaeological and the sports world when it comes to the passion of the individuals to make a mark in history. One prominent individual, Marlene Stewart Streit, is the best amateur golf player in Canadian history. At the age of fifteen, she would ride her bicycle to the Lookout Point Golf Club and payed for the \$25 club membership fee. The coach at the time, Gordon McInnis Sr., trained her for years and then she participated in the Great Britain Women's Amateur Championship in 1953. Individuals such as Marlene started out quite small to becoming the most successful amateur golfer in Canada. From an early age, she was passionate about the sport, just as I became passionate from an early age of archaeology and history. Thus, passion links the most "seemingly" opposing fields and, as a humanist, it binds the power of the human spirit.

Skate Canada Hall of Fame Emery Leger Archivist

ATHLETE PROFILE: BRIAN POCKAR

Three-time Canadian men's champion Brian Pockar is inducted posthumously into the Skate Canada Hall of Fame in the athlete category. The native of Calgary, Alta., who passed away in 1992 at the age of 32, had six consecutive podium finishes at the Canadian Figure Skating Championships beginning in 1977, including three straight wins from 1978 to 1980. He won bronze at the 1982 World Figure Skating Championships and placed 12th at the 1980 Olympic Winter Games in Lake Placid, NY.

Pockar also had a pair of podium finishes at Skate Canada International, claiming bronze in 1978 and silver in 1980. He was presented with an Alberta Achievement Award on five occasions, and was bestowed with the Government of Canada Sports Excellence Award in 1982.

Following his career, Pockar went on to become a respected figure skating commentator and analyst with CTV Sports.

Tickets to the 51st Induction Dinner & Ceremony are \$100/person and are available directly from the Saskatchewan Sports Hall of Fame.



The Hall of Fame set up a small hockey exhibit at Travel Manitoba at The Forks for the month of March as we celebrated not only the Jets' remarkable season, but our province's overall hockey legacy.

With the Winnipeg Jets magical ride to the Western Conference final came a renewed interest in the AVCO Cup which permanently resides in the Manitoba Sports Hall of Fame thanks to the Shenkarow family. We had a White Out Case in the lobby for hockey fans to reminisce about the three championships won in the 1970s.




The AVCO Cup also celebrated St. Patrick's Day with **Patrik Laine** at an autograph session March 17 at Premier Events as fans lined up for over two hours to get the Jet fan favourite's autograph. The new Feature Exhibit **Reflections of the Great War: Manitoban Athletes-in-Arms** officially opened May 1 and was well-received. Special thanks go to all of the military organizations and their heritage museums, and to the families of those Honoured members who served, for loaning us their treasures for this unique exhibit. The exhibit celebrates the 100th anniversary of Armistice and will run until the end of the year so be sure to come and see the fascinating role sport played in the great conflict (see promo bottom).

The Hall of Fame once again awarded prizes for the best sport history projects at the annual Red River Heritage Fair held at the University of Winnipeg on May 3.

Big news came on May 8 when the Province of Manitoba announced that the Manitoba Sports Hall of Fame had been designated a **Star Attraction**. The Museum gallery joined six other new sites and Minister **Blaine Pederson** attended the media conference to make the announcement. Watch for the blue signs with the big yellow star coming soon in the streets leading to 145 Pacific!

The **1978 Winnipeg Jets** (inducted in 2005) celebrated their 40th anniversary of winning that same AVCO Cup and the Hall of Fame was there with them for three days (see photo left) at the host Fort Garry Hotel, at a sponsors' reception at Taylor McCaffrey's offices and for their luncheon at the Fort Garry which raised funds for the Bobby Hull Foundation on May 12.
