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TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION IN THE SPORT HERITAGE COMMUNITY

The federal government recently passed legislation to make September 30 a federal statutory holiday called the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. The day provides an opportunity to recognize and commemorate the tragic history and ongoing legacy of residential schools, and to honour their survivors, their families and communities.

The residential school system, established in the mid-1800's, forced Indigenous children across Canada to attend government sponsored schools that were meant to assimilate them into Euro-Canadian society. The schools, often operated by religious organizations, separated children from their families and forbid them from speaking their native languages or practicing their cultures. Abuse and neglect were endemic at residential schools, the last of which closed in 1996, and the repercussions are still being felt today by families of survivors through inter-generational trauma in addition to the survivors themselves.

In 2007 the Federal Government and the churches that operated residential schools, agreed to provide financial compensation to former students under the Residential Schools Settlement Agreement. Out of this agreement, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada was established "to facilitate reconciliation among former students, their families, their communities and all Canadians." From 2007 to 2015, the Commission created a historical record of the residential schools system, heard from more than 6,500 witnesses and hosted seven national events to engage the Canadian public, educate them about the legacy of the system and share the experiences of former students and their families. In 2015, the Commission released its full report including 94 Calls to Action to address the legacy of residential schools and move reconciliation efforts forward.

Call to Action #87 specifically identifies sport heritage:

87. We call upon all levels of government, in collaboration with Aboriginal peoples, sports halls of fame, and other relevant organizations, to provide public education that tells the national story of Aboriginal athletes in history.

The Canadian Association for Sport Heritage calls on our members to support Call to Action #87 and share the ways your organization is working on the Call to Action with CASH.



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How Sport Halls of Fame are Approaching Reconciliation

BC Sports Hall of Fame Indigenous Sport Gallery

The gallery celebrates Indigenous and First Nations athletes who have made an impact on British Columbia's sport history. It is the largest permanent museum gallery or exhibit devoted to Indigenous sport in Canadian history in North America today and possibly worldwide. The BC Sports Hall of Fame has been an international leader in celebrating Indigenous sport achievements for over a decade since the opening of the Aboriginal Sport Gallery in 2008, which at the time was the first permanent museum exhibit devoted to Indigenous/Aboriginal sport in North America. The approach to build the gallery was truly collaborative province-wide with key Hall of Fame staff working with a committee of Indigenous Sport leaders to develop the gallery concept and content. Further communication with and input from other Indigenous sport athletes, leaders, and communities refined the gallery content and made the gallery truly inclusive of all peoples, genders, and sports. Canada's Sports Hall of Fame - Indigenous Sports Heroes Education Experience

This multimedia exhibit is a national education initiative designed for Kindergarten to Grade 12 students and will be available at no cost to teachers across Canada. This seven-year initiative was created by Canada's Sports Hall of Fame in collaboration with Indigenous Hall of Famers and countless Indigenous, sport, museum and historical partners. The Indigenous Sport Heroes Education Experience is the first of its kind educational exhibit that shares the stories of the 14 Indigenous Hall of Famers. This initiative will bring awareness to the truths and experiences of these incredible Indigenous heroes, which in turn, prompts conversation about equity and inclusion, through the lens of sport, to ultimately foster a more informed, united, inclusive and stronger Canada. The digital book also includes chapters on the creation of the Tom Longboat Award, Tom Longboat award winners and Indigenous Games featuring the Arctic Winter Games, North American Indigenous Games and the World Indigenous Games. The athletes include Olympic paddler Richard Dalton, three-time Olympic rower Todd Hallett, fastball star Robert Putnam, and Acadia basketball sensation Ted Upshaw. The Hall will also welcome Mark Dacey's 2004 Brier-winning curling team. In the builder category, Special Olympics coach, team manager and mission staff member Cathy Mason, along with Olympic and Paralympic sailing coach Brian Todd, will also be inducted. We are proud to announce that, for a second straight year, Eastlink will be broadcasting the Induction ceremony live to the province.

Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame Launches Mobile App

The Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame has launched a mobile app as part of an initiative to have a greater presence across the province. Powered by ThinkProxi, the app allows users to access up-to-date information, unlock exclusive content when visiting exhibits, enhance their interactive experience, and test their skills with trivia and games.

While the Hall of Fame facility may currently be closed, we have been busy working on travelling exhibits and satellite displays at other locations throughout Nova Scotia. Mark and his partner, Rob, were on hand as we unveiled our newest exhibit, "True to You in Sport," which examines the journeys and challenges faced by four of our Honoured Members who identify as LGBTQ2S+. Unveiling the exhibit has been a lifelong goal of Breanna Suk, our Collections and Exhibit Coordinator.

"Every person should have the ability to pursue their dreams without fear of discrimination or prejudice based on age, race, religion, gender, or sexual identity. Unfortunately, this is not the case," says Breanna. "Many athletes have faced, and many still do, discrimination from sport organizations, team management, coaches and even fellow athletes for things they have no control over."

The exhibit focuses on the stories Honoured Members Mark Tewksbury, Danielle Peers, Keely Brown, and Kessie Stefanyk in the

hopes that their stories will help the next generation of LGBTQ2S+ athletes be true to themselves in all aspects of their lives, both in and outside the locker room.

"We have seen advancements in sport towards greater diversity and inclusion, especially when it comes to gender and racial equality. One area in which sports has a long way to go is in ending the stigma and discrimination towards LGBTQ2S+ athletes and coaches. For years many of our high performance, elite athletes have been forced to hide who they are in fear of losing everything they worked for. "

The new exhibit, located in the Hall of Fame Gallery, is open from 9:00 am – 5:00 pm

Monday to Friday, and 10:00 am – 5:00 pm on weekends and select holidays. It is expected to remain up through the end of 2021.
